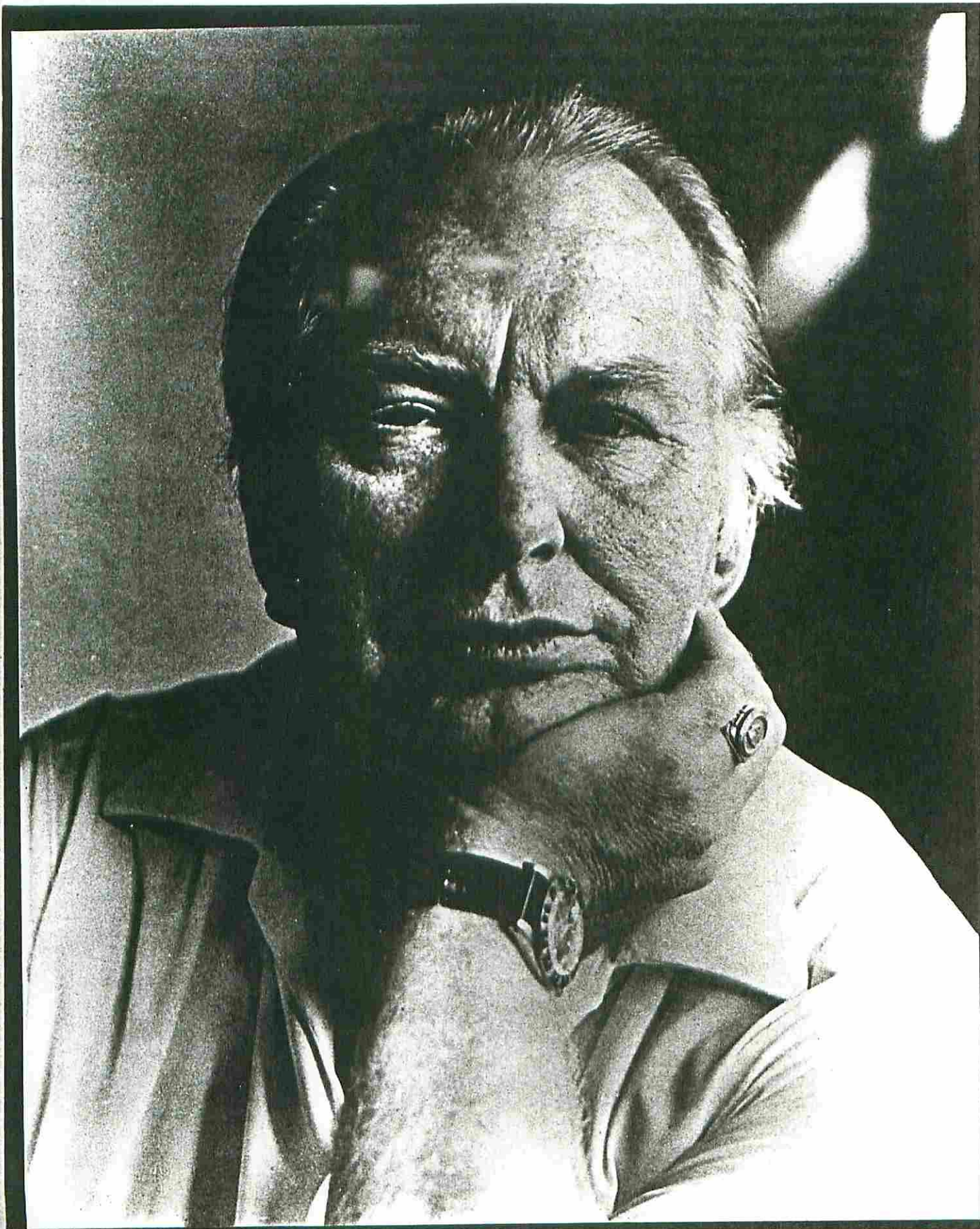

# 'Drug Babies' and the Schools

They're Growing Up, Prompting a Debate Over How to Teach Them—and How Well They Learn

**T**he 4-year-old girl in teacher Vicky Ferrera's preschool class had made remarkable progress, the high point of her year being when she learned to tie her shoes. Mastering that task, which her pals asked her to help them with, made the little girl proud.

Then, in one week, her class took a field trip, went to an assembly and entertained a visitor. To most 4-year-olds, the disruptions would have been easy to handle, even fun.

### Not a Trivial Incident

But the deviation from routine so doused the 4-year-old's self-confidence that she suddenly forgot how to tie her shoes. She re-established the skill only after Ferrera taught her how to do it again.

Though the incident may seem trivial, it is not in Ferrera's South-Central classroom, where such small matters are part of a bigger concern for the Los Angeles Unified School District, public educators and health experts nationwide. They all are beginning to deal with the emergence of a generation of children, like Ferrera's student, who are known simply as "drug babies."

These youngsters have been the focus of intense media scrutiny, which has etched into the public consciousness images of infants wailing in hospital cribs as they suffer the effects of their

mothers' abuse of alcohol, cocaine, phencyclidine (PCP) and other substances.

But what has been less publicized is that as the drug babies have grown—many now are reaching school age—their presence is prompting questions and concerns about their future in society.

Though studies still are under way, drug babies already have surprised experts by displaying a wider than expected range of academic abilities. This, in turn, has underscored to some researchers the importance that children's environment may have on their development.

Experts also are unsure just how many drug babies there are, though they caution that contrary to some public perceptions, the youngsters are not just the offspring of minority group members and the poor.

### Instructional Techniques

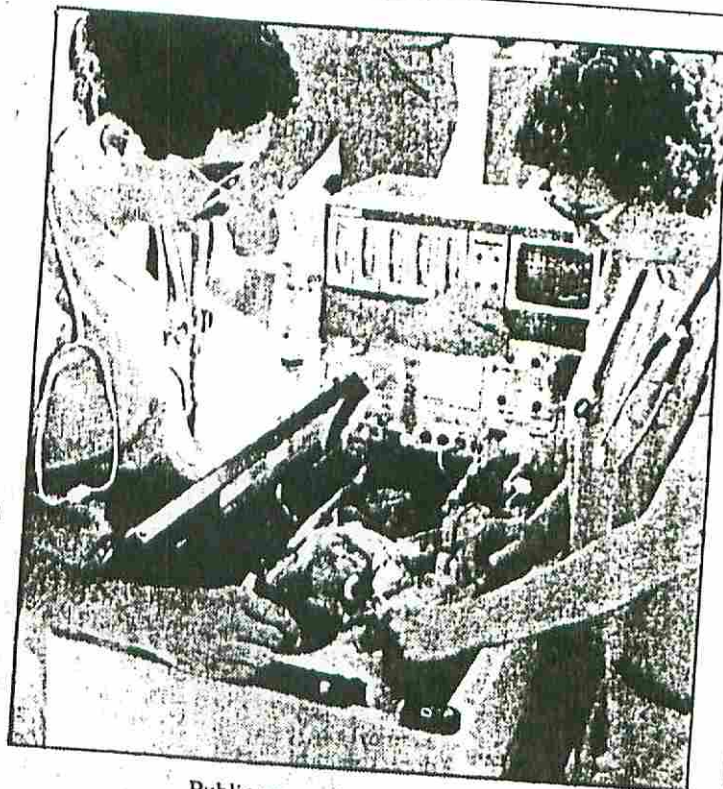
In Los Angeles, the school district has taken the unusual—and, in some quarters, controversial—step of housing some drug babies, now ages 4 and 5, in three special classrooms in two inner city schools.

There, teachers like Ferrera are trying to identify instructional techniques to help get the drug babies back

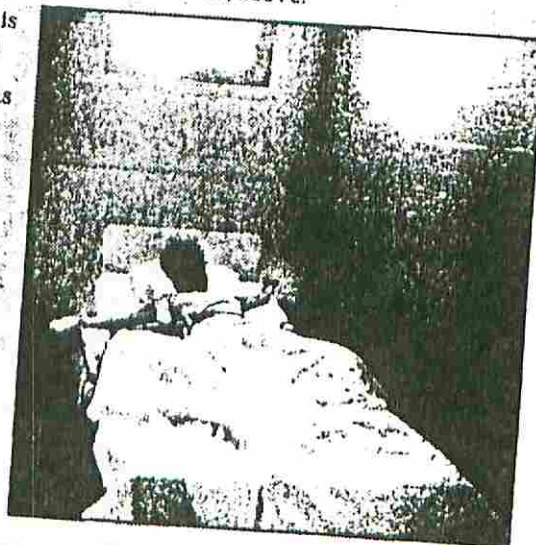


# **Kids of Mothers Who Used Drugs: Images, Reality**



Public perception of drug babies has been limited to memorable images of wailing infants suffering effects of mothers' substance abuse in hospital wards, above.

But the less-publicized reality is that the generation of children whose mothers used drugs is approaching school age. Experts are unsure how many drug babies there may be. It also is hard to discern what drug-related learning disabilities children may suffer without knowing what substances their mothers took (such as the PCP-user at right). Studies have shown drug babies display a wider than expected range of academic abilities. This has underscored the importance environment plays in children's development.

## Girl, 7, Shares Cocaine With Pals;

The mother of a 7-year-old girl was arrested for placing a golf ball-sized chunk of cocaine in the backpack of her daughter, who sampled it with friends during their lunch period at a San Fernando Valley school, authorities said Tuesday.

Nine students at Canoga Park Lutheran School, who told teachers they tasted the substance out of curiosity Monday, were taken to a hospital after it was found to be cocaine.

A few of the children complained of stomachaches, police said, but all were released to their parents in good health.

If the children had ingested more of the substance, it could have been life-threatening, authorities said.

### 'Spit It Out'

"It tasted like medicine so I spit it out," said Sara Comden, 7, one of the friends who licked the cocaine chunk when it was passed around.

The children said they thought it might be candy or sugar.

The cocaine was taken away from the students by Sara's older sister, Sacha Comden, 11, who saw the group with it

in the schoolyard and took it to the school office.

"I thought it was chalk," said Sacha, a sixth-grader. "It was in a dirty, plastic bag. They said they didn't know what it was but were eating it. I didn't want them to get sick so I took it.

"I didn't think it was drugs. Why would a little kid have drugs?"

Police said the cocaine was brought to school by the daughter of Maria Christina Torres, 39, a Colombian national who lives in Topanga Canyon. Torres, who had a year-old drug case against her dismissed last week, was arrested Monday afternoon on charges of cocaine possession and child endangerment when she came to the school in the 7300 block of Jordan Avenue to pick up her daughter.

### Released on \$100,000 Bail

She was later released from the Van Nuys jail on \$100,000 bail. Her daughter and a 5-year-old son were taken into custody by the Los Angeles County Division of Youth Services and later released to a relative, police said.

Waldo Cloeter, principal of the 214-student school,

which provides drug awareness programs in upper classes, said the incident will spark the start of similar programs for the lower grades.

"I guess now we have to look at it as a threat to all children," he said.

Police said they have not determined how the cocaine ended up in the backpack that Torres' daughter took to school.

About midway through the morning school session, police and school administrators said, Torres' daughter found the plastic bag containing the drug and the second-grader showed it to her friends when she joined them at a group of picnic tables in the schoolyard at the lunch recess.

"She starts passing it around, and there are nine students that either lick it or bite off a chunk of it," Los Angeles Police Lt. William Gaida said.

Officials said there is no indication that any of the children, seven from the second grade and two from the fifth, knew what they were tasting. Second-grade teacher

# Mother calls rehabilitation of addict son a miracle

A Revere mother of 6 says, "It's a miracle, what can I say" — in response to how she felt about her son's withdrawing from drugs at the Narconon drug rehabilitation program in Allston.
